Our Beliefs and Policy Principles, which support our Mission and Vision:



Colorado's state and local transportation system must be adequately funded

- >> Our state legislature must look for ways to increase funding to CDOT for operations and maintenance and agencies must pursue all options for federal funding.
- >> Focus on implementation of projects identified for use of the SB21-260 before expanding the sources and allocations.



Colorado's state and local transportation agencies must use all available tools and partnerships

- >> Agencies should continue to embrace public-private partnerships and alternative delivery models.
- >> Local governments must have access to tools and funding approaches such as local elections and regional transportation authorities.





Colorado's transportation system is - and should be - all modes working together

- >> Our transportation system needs to be well balanced with investment in all modes to support access, equity, and sustainability of our system.
- >> We must consider all options to meet our needs and invest in multimodal approaches to serve our urban and rural regions, counties, and municipalities.

- >> We should be encouraging innovation by modifying polices and agency expectations to support new approaches to sustainability in our transportation systems.
- » Our transportation system needs to provide resilience for adequate emergency response and evacuation routes in the event of natural disasters.
