Our Core Commitment

We lead with pragmatism, collaboration, and bold vision—working to ensure that Colorado's transportation network is built for the challenges and opportunities ahead.

Key Challenges

- Congestion: Colorado's urban areas <u>rank 36th</u> <u>nationally for congestion</u>, with drivers losing an average of 22.8 hours annually in traffic delays.*
- Pavement Conditions: <u>Urban interstate pavement</u> <u>ranks 45th in the nation</u>, reflecting significant deterioration and wear.*
- Safety: Urban areas also rank <u>36th for traffic fatalities</u>, underscoring the need for safety-focused infrastructure improvements.*

Funding Realities

- Limited Flexibility: Since 2017, a growing share of transportation fees, passed by the Colorado General Assembly and signed by the Governor, <u>have been</u> <u>directed toward environmental mitigation and mass</u> <u>transit—often at the expense of road maintenance</u> <u>and expansion</u>. (Common Sense Institute Colorado)
- Inconsistent Funding: Colorado General Fund transfers to transportation are unpredictable and frequently not targeted toward roadway improvements.
- **Deferred Maintenance Costs:** Years of underinvestment have led to costly, large-scale projects that consume most of the available transportation budget.

Move Colorado Strategic Priorities



Infrastructure Investment:

Prioritize sustained funding for maintenance and congestion relief on critical urban corridors.



Operational Efficiency:

Invest in technology and traffic operations strategies that improve flow and reduce delays across all modes.



Multimodal Integration for Urban Colorado:

Expand and connect transit options to provide alternatives to single-occupancy vehicles.



Safety Enhancements:

Use data-driven approaches to improve roadway design and reduce fatalities and serious injuries.
